Home Learning

Our Home Learning Expectations:

- Daily Reading (5 x a week for a minimum of ten minutes)
- Regular Times Table Practice on TTRS (At least 3 x a week)
- One set of themed Grammar, Punctuation or Spelling questions a week (10-20 mins)
- Help children learn spelling words these aren't formally tested but monitored in the children's writing

Family Project Grid (1 grid a term, completed over the second half term and includes a range of tasks linked to the Learning Journey)

How can you help your child?

- Read with your child talk about the books you love & ask them about what they like
- Help them learn logins and passwords (TTRS, Purple Mash, Teams)
- Develop independence get them to look after their own things – water bottles, snack boxes etc.
- Get involved with events in school and out
- Enjoy the summer holidays spend lots of time outdoors; visit museums; do activities; play in the garden
- Become a parent volunteer

- Did you know? One week's holiday a year adds up to over a ter by the time your child leaves school!






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For children with SEND with the highest level of need Usually linked to an EHC Plan Often from outside the school's staff and resources Pupils with special educational needs and/or disabilities (SEND) are quickly identified and supported. Staff have access to a comprehensive range of assessment tools which they use to precisely pinpoint pupils' needs. They use this information well, providing just the right amount of support for pupils to access the curriculum and learn well. By only providing the exact support that is needed, pupils with SEND develop both their independence and a strong work ethic.

Signing up process for Clubs
